A Brief History of Watson Island Developments

1920s	Watson Island was created from sand and debris dredged when Government Cut was deepened for ships. MacArthur Causeway was constructed. Three slips for large ships were proposed. Chalk's International Airlines, a seaplane service, opened on the island.
1940s	Miami Outboard Club and Miami Yacht Club built clubhouses on the island. Goodyear blimps began mooring there.
1949	Watson Island was deeded to city of Miami by the state to be used for public purposes only; any private development was to be approved by the state; leasing the land for private development would require a public vote. (It was originally deeded to the city in 1919 but later deeded back to the state.)
1961	Ichimura Miami-Japan Garden was built.
1976	Dade Helicopter moved to the island.
1979	Theme park Diplomat World was proposed.
1985	The tourist fishing fleet relocated to the Island.
1986	A marina, hotel, and boat exhibition center were proposed. Carollo claimed it would cost tax-payers and accused some involved parties of communist ties. In the aftermath, the commission approved the "Carollo Amendment", requiring a voter referendum on sales of city property when there are less than three bidders.
1990s	Proposals for the island included an air transport center, a mega-yacht marina, bringing back Chalk's, the Miami Science Museum, a naval museum with a light aircraft carrier, an indoor ski resort, and a commercial port.
1995	The public voted to allow Parrot Jungle to relocate there.
2000	Building two giant cruise ship terminals was proposed.
2003	Jungle Island (formerly Parrot Jungle) opened on the island.
2004	Miami Children's Museum relocated to the island.
2014	Port of Miami Tunnel opened.
